People Attentive to Children (PATCH) is a community service organization established in 1976 with the mission to support and improve the quality and availability of care for the young people of Hawaii. As Hawaii's only statewide agency specializing in child care resource and referral services, PATCH has been supporting Hawaii's families and early childhood education (ECE) professionals for more than four decades, reaching over 50,000 individuals annually.





PATCH's services are rooted in foundational pillars that contribute to thriving communities – access to quality child care and early childhood education, safe and healthy homes and learning environments, economic and workforce development, and the overall health and wellbeing of our keiki and families. When keiki have access to quality care during the earliest years, their foundation for future success is strengthened. When our keiki thrive, parents can thrive. When families thrive, our communities thrive. PATCH services ensure that the network of care for keiki in communities across our islands continues to be strengthened and expanded to meet the needs of our youngest keiki and their families so that parents/caregivers can contribute to a booming economy and thriving communities.

Child Care Resource and Referral agencies strive to support child care settings that help children grow and learn by supporting providers with training, coaching, and continuing education. CCR&Rs also support quality early learning by:

- Informing parents about child development, early learning, and quality child care programs.
- Informing communities about the critical links between early learning and later success in school and the vital role that child care providers play in ensuring children are learning what they need to be ready to start school.

PATCH assists with:

- Assisting new child care providers with the start-up process
- Help providers meet licensing requirements
- Offer free training in topics like health and safety, child development, and business efficiency
- Work with local and state governments and the private sector to leverage resources for building and maintaining the supply of quality child care.

### Lisa Murphy - Ooey Gooey

PATCH had an opportunity to have nationally known trainer Lisa Murphy available to provide our providers statewide training on Creative Art with Young Children! Art is not a recipe for child care! PATCH sponsored this training virtually allowing our providers statewide to join in on some fun. This session was all hands-on, no more dittos, no more patterns, and no more cut-out art but oriented art position. The workshop provided an in-depth examination of the rationale for the emphasis on process over product, including a discussion about what this phrase really means! Participants had time to engage in dialogue regarding "art" for children and identify where they are on their journey toward process and way from product-oriented "cookie-cutter" craptivity projects. There were about 37 providers in attendance. Providers provided nothing but positive feedback including creative ideas to incorporate into their daily work with children.

## **For Families**

Child Care Resource & Referral (CCR&R) organization serve as a resource hub for families, child care professionals and communities. CCR&R increase access to high-quality child care. PATCH helps families find child care, provide resources, offer Preschool Open Doors Preschool Subsidy programs and training on child development. CCR&R assist families by phone, in person or web based.

PATCH provided 20,605 child care referrals statewide.

PATCH assisted 1350 at-risk children attended preschool for a year with \$5,292,733 state tuition assistance. 1053 were from single parent households. POD PATCH enrolled 9 new families in the NAVY EFMP Respite Care Program serving a total of 37 families (39 Children).

Child Care in Your Home (pilot) had 16 children enrolled receiving care form family preferred providers.

## For the Community

PATCH has a friendly and knowledgeable staff ready to assist with early childhood needs. Offering free child development and ECE training, a plethora of community resources, and an on-site Career Counselor to help those interested navigate the Early childhood pathways. For those interested in working in the field of early childhood, PATCH offers Scholarship opportunities. Wanting to open a daycare? PATCH has a dedicated Family Child Care Recruiter ready to provide support from the beginning to the end of the process. Data is provided to community partners upon request. PATCH has a point-in-time snapshot of each individual county as well as a data request form that can be tailored to your ECE data needs.

One hundred and one data request were received from the community. PATCH was able to fulfill all data requests received.

PATCH has provided 326 trainings to those in the community consisting of: families, resource caregivers, LE and others.

PATCH's point in time data received over 599 hits since the link went live October 2022

### **For Providers**

Quality child care programs are essential to working parents and to the economy. Parents need the care to work or attend school or training programs. Businesses need quality child care programs so their employees can get to work. Quality child care providers protect the health and safety of the children in their care and help children learn and be prepared for school.

Operating a quality child care business takes work. Child care providers need access to training and support to start their businesses and continually improve the quality of their care. PATCH assisted:

Provided 513 free Training, inperson and online live webinars providing over 1,400 hours of training. PATCH had 1,851 providers in attendance.

PATCH enrolled 23 providers in our Ka'Upena Share Services Program in our first year.

Registry staff has verified 3116 credentials while providing career counseling to 130 practitioners. Over 14,810 Health and Training Certificates were submitted.

PATCH assisted nine potential providers in becoming registered, providing 54 additional seats. Recruiters provided technical assistance to over 150 inquiries and potential providers. CQI - had provided 6 networking sessions with 25 providers in attendance. Seven providers enrolled in and received TA.

Cash for Caring assisted 32 providers statewide providing more than \$8,000 in funding.

Scholarships were awarded to 109 applicants totaling more than \$65k

PATCH assisted 8 Professional Development Specialist to travel to neighbor islands to conduct observation with the CDA applicant.

Through the USDA Food Program 398,116 meals were served to 1155 kids through 152 providers.



### NEW PROGRAMS 2022

### GQI

The overall goal of this program is to improve Early Learning & Child Care Professional Skills, knowledge, & practices in working with children & families by utilizing technical assistance (TA) & coaching services provided by PATCH to build Maui County's Early Learning & child care workforce that will, in turn, impact child care avilability to support & aid in the rebuild & resotration of Hawaii'i's economic recovery

### KA'UPENA SHARED SERVICES

A program to assist providers with the business aspects of their work. We offer resources, support, networking and technology help through Early Learning Ventures Alliance Core.

The Core System helps with billing and invoicing, attendance tracking, online enrollment, parent and child records, food program report and more.

### CCIYH

The Department of Defense (DoD) Child Care in Your Home (CCYH) Fee Assistance Pilot Program serves military families whose full-time child care needs are best met by a child care provider coming into the military member's home. For qualifying families and providers offered enrollment, the CCYH Fee Assistance Pilot Program provides fee assistance towards full-time in-home child care costs for a minimum of 30 hours to a maximum of 60 hours of child care weekly.

In 2022, 9 families were enrolled in the CYCC Pilot Program. PATCH provided quarterly monitoring and support to the families and submitted site evaluations to Child Care Aware of America. The CCYC Pilot program continues to grow and evolve with hopes to develop into full-time program offered in more cities across America.
